Graidh an Tig Thu? (Pronounce - " Grahan - jeek - dtu")

Two Old Gaelic Songs Harmonized, paraphrased and Arranged for solo or Unison Treble Voices by Peggy Carter

(Text includes phrases in old Gaelic language.)

Created from two Gaelic songs in a unison setting – combining Gaelic phrases with original English lyrics. The first tune here is based loosely on "Shule Aroon," a lament from Ireland in which a young lass expresses sorrow and helplessness after sending her lover to war. The second song is from the Orkney Islands off the Scottish coast. The lonely lass has left her home to go with her lover to a foreign land, where he has abandoned her for another. She sings of her longing for the homeland, and begs her lover to return. The inclusion of Gaelic phrases helps preserve the language connection.

Historical background: The first Gaelic settlement in the US was around 1730, but by 1776 migration was discouraged. The first Gaelic music in America could be called "Scot-Eirie" as it ethnically is related to both Scotland and Ireland. The trade routes between these two

countries was responsible for a very active interchange of customs and traditions, and many tunes belong to both or either.

Folk songs helped to preserve the heritage from which these immigrants came, and at the same time the music contributed to the folk literature which was carried to America by the earliest settlers and became a part of the American musical heritage.
